A 60 yo female was admitted on Friday evening by nurse practioner for constipation. In the ER patient had ct showing constipation. She was given several treatments in the ER and was admitted to the medical floor. I picked her up Saturday. Since she had a h/o chronic pain medication, i treated her conservatively thinking that she would eventually have a BM. I treated here with soap suds enema's, milk of mag and mag citrate. Saturday evening, nurse practioner ordered a routine KUB. By Sunday morning the kub had not been done. I asked to have the KUB completed as soon as possible. I then went and rounded on ICU and other patients. Since i did not hear anything from radiology, i assumed the diagnosis was still constipation. By 3:00PM pateint started to vomit. I had by that time given reglan. Since the xray report was not back, I asked if someone could pull up the x ray for me. When i lookd at the KUB, i felt patient may be obstructed. I immediately called the surgeon who was at the hospital and she came and looked at the KUB with me. She did not feel the patient was obstructed when looking at the film. She and her physician assistant went and examined the patient. By this time my shift was over. I worked ten hr days at this facility. At 10:00PM patient was sent to ct scan by the surgeon, and the patient coded in radiology. She was transfered to the ICU and she expired around 0600 Monday morning. I called the hospital on Monday from another hospital where I was employed to find out how the surgery went and i was informed about the incidence.
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Interpreting Malpractice Payment Information

North Carolina Medical Board Public Action associated with a malpractice payment

An important factor to consider when interpreting malpractice payment information is whether the payment is associated with a public action of the NC Medical Board. The Board reviews the quality of care associated with every malpractice payment involving a North Carolina licensee. The Board takes public action when its investigation determines patient care was below accepted and prevailing standards.

When considering malpractice payment data, please keep in mind:

- The existence of a payment does not necessarily mean that malpractice has occurred. Nor is a payment necessarily evidence of incompetence, misconduct or an admission of wrongdoing on the part of the licensee.
- It often takes years for a malpractice claim to move through the legal and/or liability insurance systems. The incident that resulted in a payment may have taken place years before the payment was made.
- Malpractice payment histories vary by area of practice. Some licensees may have a higher-than-average incidence of malpractice payments because they specialize in treating patients who are at a high risk for problems.
- Malpractice insurance companies sometimes settle cases because it is less costly to make a monetary settlement than it is to defend a case in court. Many times, such cases are settled without a finding of fault or admission of negligence by the licensee.
